



The Historical Goldmine

Recently I was lucky enough to be invited into the home of Mr. Edward H. Wiswesser, a retired Draftsman who now lives in the Mount Penn area in Reading. During his teens, he would rail fan the yards and shops in Reading, and would often visit the drafting department of the Reading Company Locomotive Shops. He studied Drafting at Wyomissing Polytechnic Institute (now Berks Technical Institute) and was hired as a draftsman for a firm in Toledo Ohio. During World War Two he used his skills for the war effort, working in the U.S. Navy Ship-yards in Philadelphia.

To my surprise, and not knowing his history, I found very little Railroad Models in his basement work area. The walls were lined almost floor to ceiling with warship models, and naval aircraft hung from fishing line in the basement ceiling. Impressive none the less, I was there for trains. Mr. Wiswesser opened an old flat drawing storage file cabinet and pulled out a stack of large drawings, some photo copied reproductions, and some done on blue printers presses. Jackpot! As he went through the drawings, he spoke of watching the locomotives work in the area having first hand knowledge of most of the types he had drawn. He handed me a price list which cataloged all of the Reading and "Foreign" Equipment he had either drawn or had reproductions made of. His collection also includes reproductions of Reading Company Locomotive Shop drawings, which were the drawings the builders used to erect locomotives! The drawings are 3/4" and 1 1/2" scale, and include everything one would need to build a working live steam locomotive, however since the originals are 80+ years old, the reproductions aren't as clear as some would like. The originals were saved in the 1970s when Conrail took over the Reading and began destroying all of the engineering department's drawings and files, so Mr. Wiswesser's reproductions are truly a one in a million find. The prices were more than reasonable, and I picked up a pack of 30 drawings that were included in his book Steam Locomotives of the Reading and P&R Railroads and a set of drawings of the Reading's Flagship Streamliner "Crusader".

Mr. Wiswesser then let me leaf through his book that is now long out of print, originally published by Greenberg, the publishers of many fine Lionel collectors guides. Since Greenberg has been bought out by Kalmbach, there has not been any talk of a reprint, so his book is difficult to find, but not impossible. The book is hardbound, 288 pages in length and includes hundreds of simple elevation drawings, photos and 30 ¹/₄" scale drawings of the more famous Reading Locomotives, like the Crusader, T-1, and a variety of Camelback types.

For serious Reading fans, and those who appreciate the artistry of technical drafting, Mr. Wiswesser's drawings are a must have. After the holidays, I will be placing an order to get as many more of his drawings that I can afford, hopefully somehow keeping railroad history alive through his knowledge.
